









Survival Requirement Joint Tenancy

If neither joint tenant survives the other by 120 hours, property is split equally among their heirs

Survivor lives beyond 120 hrs—What happens?



Tim dies first



Sharon dies6th day

Property Distribution--Sharon dies on 6th day



All to Sharon's parents

Survivor lives beyond 120 hrs



Tim dies6th day



Sharondies first

Property Distribution: Tim survives Sharon beyond 120 hours

-All to Tim's parents



Consequences of joint tenancy



- All to Tim's parents
- All to Sharon's parents
- 1/2 to Tim's parents &1/2 to Sharon's parents

JT Title Reads

John Doe and Mary Doe as Joint **Tenants with Right** of Survivorship and not as Tenants in Common









Payable on Death Designation (POD)

- Accounts at financial institutions
 - Savings Accounts
 - Certificates of Deposit
 - Checking Accounts



Payable on Death Designation (POD)

- At death ownership passes to POD beneficiaries
- No Probate



Payable on Death Designation (POD)

- Sole Ownership of account
 - Marsha A. Goetting
- POD Debbie Buczinski and Donna Chamberlain, equally

Joint Tenancy & POD

- Wording on account
 - Barb Miller & Jack Miller joint tenants with right of survivorship
- POD Montana 4-H Foundation



Transfers on Death (TOD) Registration

- No probate
 - Stocks, publicly traded
 - Bonds
 - Mutual Funds



Beneficiary Designations

- Annuity polices
- Deferred compensation plans
 - -401 (k), 403 (b), 457
- IRAs (Traditional & Roth)
- Employee benefit plans

What is a Beneficiary Deed?

 A way to convey real property to one or more grantee beneficiaries upon death without the cost of probate

What is a Grantee Beneficiary?



Party to whom an owner grants interest in Montana real property



Grantee Beneficiary Rights?



- NONE

- Effective only upon death of owner
 - Can't use for collateral
 - Can't sell
 - Is not owner

Beneficiary Deed Recorded



- Before death of owner
 - Clerk and Recorder
 - Montana county where property is located


Survivors: two children & grandchild


Survivors: one child & grandchildren





Example: Second generation



Example 1: Siblings, Nieces, and Nephews survive you

Assume you pass away without a written will. You have two sisters who passed away before you. You have two brothers who survived you.

Your two living brothers receive 1/4 each of your assets.

Your niece (of your deceased sister) receives 1/4 because that is the share your sister would have received had she survived you. This is called a division by *right of representation*.

Your two nephews (of your other deceased sister) each receive 1/8 of your assets because they split the 1/4 share your sister would have received if she had survived you. This is called a division by right of representation.

If this is not the division you desire, then you need to write a will.

Example 2: Siblings, Nieces, and Grand Nephews survive you

Assume you pass away without a written will. You have two sisters who passed away before you. You have two brothers who survived you.

Your two living brothers receive 1/4 each of your assets.

Your niece (of your deceased sister) receives 1/4 because that is the share your sister would have received if she had survived you. This is called a division by *right of representation*.

Your two grand nephews (children of your deceased nephew) each receive 1/16 of your assets because they split the 1/8 share your nephew would have received if he had survived you. This is a division by right of representation.

If this is not the division you desire, then you need to write a will.



What is a will?

A written document describing how its maker wants property distributed after his or her death



Holographic Wills



- Signature & material provisions in handwriting of the testator
- No witnesses are necessary
- Legal in Montana



Testamentary Trust

-Established by a written will



Why Testamentary Trust?

- Financially incapacitated/ incompetent heir:
 - Can't manage money
 - Addiction problems



Why Testamentary Trust?

Leave remainder assets to charity after children & grandchildren have been educated



Trust Agreement

Written document containing instructions to trustee

Discretionary Standard:

Trustee judgment

- Health
- Education
- Maintenance
- Support



Trustee Decision

 Chris wants to take a trip during the summer to Europe

•"It would be a very educational experience," says Chris

Mandatory Standard-- dictated by trust instrument

Distribute at predetermined date or occurrence



Occurrence

- Upon reaching certain age
 - •25 or 30 or ??
- At intervals
 - •Ages 25, 30, 35



Distribution of Trust Income or Principal

Use percentages instead of dollar amount in case values of assets change



Percentages

- 75% to my son, John Jones
- 15% to Montana State University Extension
